


Narrative for Design #1

Chino Hills Flag. The green represents the hills of Chino Hills and the Chino Hills State Park. It also represents the growth and harmony in the city. The blue represents the open spaces, expansiveness, and beautiful skies that we have. The *golden-brown line separating the green and blue symbolizes the 48 miles of trails the city has as well as being a city in the Golden State. The oak tree is from our current city logo and the color represents the stunning sunrises and sunsets observed in our city of Chino Hills.

Narrative for Design #3

Please describe any meaning or symbolism in your design (limited to 500 words).

The prominent swoops of the curve--framed by the hills and sun--are both dynamic and welcoming, much like the communities you find here. The layered elements point towards the rich history of the land and our city, and by extension, the depth created reflects the diversity and character of its citizens. At a closer glance, the sun rising from behind the hills *creates a "C" on its side, but I hope the sunrise motif also holds a deeper, shared significance.
